Clerk's Corner

"It's Always Something."

I wrote these words, which happen to be the title of the autobiography of the late, great Gilda Radner, as an email comment on the need for continual maintenance of our meeting house. In the early hours of the following morning-when I do my best philosophizing-it struck me that these words sum up all I can say about metaphysics. These words are the best answer I can give to the basic question, "Why is there something rather than nothing?"

The material "Something" only exists in an "Always" of time. Conversely time only occurs when there is "some thing" to measure it. The revolution of the earth around the sun measures time for me. The vibration of cesium atoms most accurately measures time for science. Stephen Hawking and other cosmologists tell me there is a quantum vibration in a vacuum, the vacuum before the big bang. They say that this energy gives rise to matter-and its companion time-through Einstein's $m=e/c^2$. They see no need of a god to create the universe-they even posit parallel universes creating themselves infinitely, eternally. That stretches my imagination: a vibration of nothing, no thing, causing something.

But, wait, don't the theologians tell us that God is "no thing"-that God is completely "other" than we can imagine? As Gilda Radner's character, Roseanna Rosannadanna, often said on Saturday Night Live, "It's always something-if it ain't one thing, it's an other."

Quarterly Meeting 04-17

Worcester Friends hosted the Rhode Island-Smithfield Quarterly Meeting post pot-luck on Sunday.

Nancy and David Haines described their role as co-clerks of the committee planning for the 2012 Friends General Conference Gathering which will be held at the University of Rhode Island in Kingston, July 1-7, 2012. The inclusive theme will be "All God's Critters Got A Place In The Choir" to combine diversity with community. Planning for the Gathering is underway. Providence Meeting is helping with a lot of the local arrangement details. The clerks extended a cordial invitation to join them in envisioning a challenging, inspirational and fruitful week. Several suggestions for programming were made from the floor and noted by the clerks. These self-appointed committee persons and Friends with ideas for programs for adults, high schoolers and juniors are urged to contact Nancy and David at haines2012@gmail.com or 508-435-9660. The next Gathering planning meeting will be held at Wellesley Friends Meeting House on April 29-30, 2011. Meetings will follow in September and be finalized in December.

Meeting for business then gathered with silent worship followed by approval of the minutes of the Octo-

ber meeting and the treasurer's report of some \$5000 in the Quarter's general funds and over \$47,000 in the Aldrich Fund for personal emergency needs. Memorial minutes for Hermann Patt, Charles Perry, of Westerly Meeting, and Grace Blaber were read. Friends approved forwarding them to Yearly Meeting with a recommendation to publish the first two.

State of Society Reports were read by representatives of Providence, Worcester and Westerly Meetings. They will be forwarded to Yearly Meeting. Smithfield Meeting members presented an unofficial oral report on the serious financial situation they are in. Key-their word-members have been lost by moving, aging, and personal tragedy. The retirement of the pastor-due in part to the financial picture-leaves them with an empty dwelling in need of a Resident Friend to care for their properties. They do find comfort by Friends volunteering to fill the pastoral role for First Day worship. The Smithfield Meeting was urged to make their State of Society report in writing as a basis for asking assistance from Quarterly and Yearly Meetings.

A period of silent worship closed the meeting, purposing to meet in Providence on July 17, 2011.

First Day School's Pennies For Peace Project Concluded

Our First Day school children had a field trip on Sunday, March 27th when they traveled to the TD bank with Katherine Barnard and Katie Green. TD bank has a coin counting machine that is free to their customers. The kids were excited to learn that their efforts raised enough money to pay for school costs

for six children in Pakistan to go to school for a whole year.

The children raised \$127.21 during their Pennies for Peace campaign that took place in November and December. A check for that amount has been mailed to Greg Mortenson's organization. (Yes, you will notice that there is a three month delay between the end of the Pennies for Peace campaign and the mailing of the check. Part of that is because of "Quaker time", but the real reason - excuse - is that we unsuccessfully tried to roll the pennies. Wow! That really takes a lot of time. And then Katie Green wanted to have most of the children present for the "field trip."

Pennies for Peace™ is a program of Central Asia Institute. Our donation is a restricted donation, where 100% of the money will be used for overseas program support.

Nicholas D. Kristof, a columnist for the New York Times since 2001, is a two-time Pulitzer Prize. He writes:

The furor over Greg's work breaks my heart. And the greatest loss will be felt not by those of us whose hero is discredited, nor even by Greg himself, but by countless children in Afghanistan who now won't get an education after all. But let's not forget that even if all the allegations turn out to be true, Greg has still built more schools and transformed more children's lives than you or I ever will.

As we sift the truth of these allegations, let's not allow this uproar to obscure that larger message of the possibility of change. Greg's books may or may not have been fictionalized, but there's nothing imaginary about the way some of his American donors and Afghan villagers were able to put aside their differences and prejudices and cooperate to build schools and a better world.

I remember hearing an odd news report last year. It told me that Greg Mortenson's work in Afghanistan and Pakistan was a cause of the problems that the U.S. was having in these countries. It is true that he has been amazingly successful in bringing an awareness of the area to adults and children. Was Mortenson too successful? I cannot help but wonder if he might be "targeted", as other political activists have been. - ktg

A Gift From The Alternatives To Violence Program

In 2008 I attended a workshop at NEYM Sessions about the Alternatives to Violence Project (AVP) given by Nancy Shippen and a young man from Rwanda. He had participated in AVP programs for healing wounds and rebuilding after the genocide. I was totally impressed, and wanted more information about AVP.

The Alternatives to Violence Project is a network of volunteers who run workshops for anyone who wants to find ways of resolving conflict without resorting to violence. AVP began in 1975 as a project between a New York prison and Quakers. Today AVP workshops are given in prisons and in communities around the world. In March, I had the opportunity to attend the Basic AVP training workshop at Shirley Massachusetts Correctional Institute. While most of the activities and exercises were familiar to me from years of teaching Creative Conflict Solutions in the Classroom at Fitch-



burg State College, and I had led workshops at national conferences dedicated to conflict resolution participating in these exercises with prison inmates was a new experience.

The Basic AVP training took place over a weekend - Friday evening to Sunday afternoon. There were 5 AVP trainers present for the 20+ inmates and myself. Three of the trainers were inmates who had completed AVP Basic, Advanced, and Training-for-Trainers. It was an enriching and informative experience. I look forward to spending another weekend in prison in May, so I can complete the AVP Advanced training.

The gift from AVP? Oh, yes: Seeing that of God in every person. I came away from my weekend in Shirley MCI with a new appreciation for people who work in unskilled jobs. Rashad is an AVP trainer, has been in prison for 22 years. He can tell you how many days that is; how many hours have been "wasted," as he puts it. He told me that this time he was determined to stay out of jail. He would not go back to his "old ways," but rather, he would "take off the McDonald's jacket, and immediately put on the Burger King jacket" if necessary to hold two jobs and make enough money.

Immigration Workshop

Worcester town was recently (03-11-11) the site of a workshop of the Mass. Council of Churches titled Immigration, the Church and the Bible. The presenter, M. Daniel Carroll R., Prof. of Old Testament at Denver Seminary, glories in his maternal Hispanic heritage and had our rapt attention for two, two-hour well-attended sessions covering:

- (1) The Challenge, To think biblically and christianly about immigration;
- (2) The Importance, The centrality of the immigration metaphor for faith; and
- (3) Reading the Bible, A minority culture view-An Immigrant Appreciation.

Prof. Carroll noted the biblical injunctions to care for strangers because the Israelites were, and we as their heirs are, only sojourners, "strangers in a strange

land." He emphasized the work ethic of the immigrants in those lines of work most of us find unattractive.

The host committee then had sign-ups for those (mostly clergy) who wanted to go further into holding local workshops on the topic, sermons, resources, etc.

Katie Green and I attended and I hope departed with a greater appreciation of the importance of the issue. Other Friends attending were Linda Jenkins, Judy Goldberger, a Friend (name forgotten) from Hartford who is actively working on the immigrant issue, and, of course, Martha Yeager of the Providence AFSC and our own Center for Non-violent Solutions, who is right on top of it in a major way.

Prof. Carroll's list of further readings and resources is in the library for Friends who wish to delve further.

I attended the Worcester Interfaith meeting on March 31st. Worcester Interfaith has officially been renamed Central Mass Interfaith. Rev. Kevin Beam, of All Saint's Episcopal Church, moved that the Interfaith organization expand to include all of Worcester County. Because of the way legislative districts are drawn including all of the county increases the number of representatives in the legislatures and will increase the amount of money we are able to apply for and receive. After discussion, the 12 member faith communities present voted in the affirmative.

Central Interfaith is at the point of increasing involvement of member faith communities and forming a draft of a platform of issues important to all. Frank Kartheiser plans a 100 member gathering at All Saint's of member communities currently involved with Interfaith. Those assembled will be giving form to a platform of issues important to their community. Tentatively suggested issues include: education, youth, jobs, health care.

Each Church, Synagogue, Meeting is asked to send representation to the next meeting of the Central Mass Interfaith to be held May 17 at 7 pm. The meeting is currently scheduled for All Saint's. Each person at the last meeting offered up the number of members it felt capable of bringing to the meeting. Anyone who knows Franks will understand my enthusiastic response: 5-7 representatives from Worcester Friend's Meeting. I think we can gather 7 Friends to attend this important gathering meeting. Each attendee will be able to spend time with a another member to form friendships. A platform of issues will be formulated and plans for the future undertaken.

We were a member of Worcester Interfaith in 2010 and are continuing in 2011 with Central Mass Interfaith. Our level of financial commitment is open. Consider e-mailing or catching me on Sunday for more information and to sign up for this faith based social advocacy force. Frank and Kevin Beam are quite accessible and can better answer many particular questions.

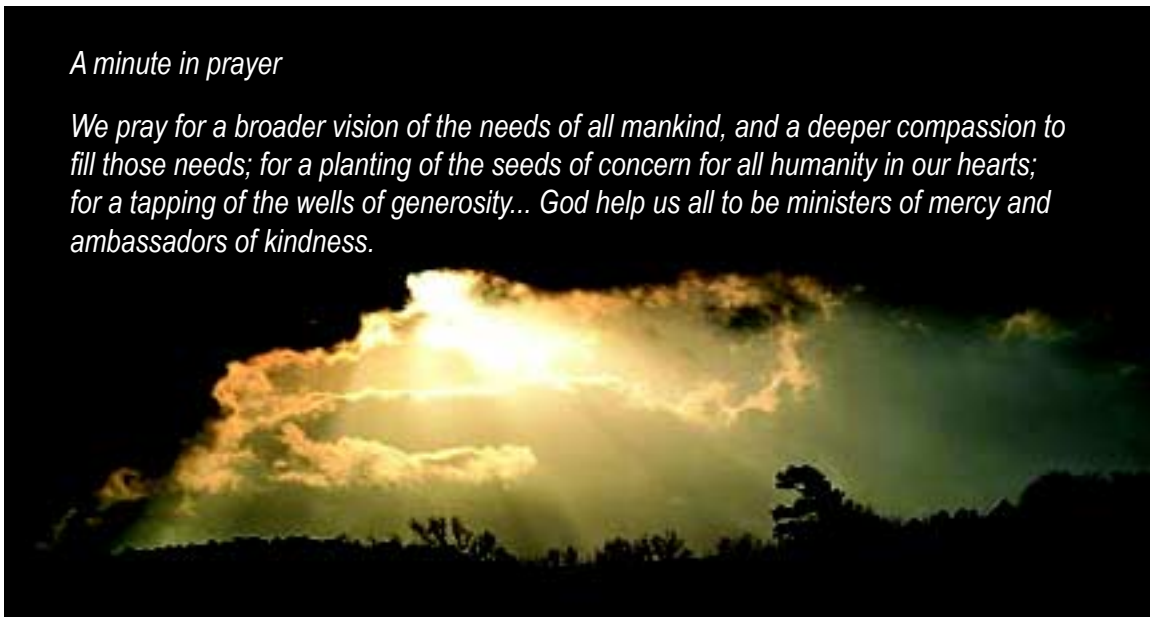

01-04-10-2011 Meeting began with a period of silence and a reading from On Living with a Concern for Gospel Ministry, by Brian Drayton.

02-04-10-2011 Ministry & Counsel presented the State of Society report for Friends consideration. Friends approved the report with minor revisions. It will be forwarded to Smithfield Quarterly Meeting.

03-04-10-2011 Matt Shorten was approved by the committee as the new clerk of the committee.

04-04-10-2011 Bible study began, led by Jeff Knowlton; the next will be April 17 at 9:30 AM.

05-04-10-2011 Overlook worship group has had good attendance in their new meeting place.

06-04-10-2011 Friends ask that the committee continue to stay in touch with Friends who have not been able to attend, or have been absent.

07-04-10-2011 Peace and Social Concerns reports good success with the Spoken Word Series. There was very good attendance with last night's program. Next month's program will be on the poetry of Robert Frost.

08-04-2011 The committee helped sponsor "Life Leadership Award Ceremony" at Briarwood, which was well attended.

09-04-10-2011 Mohammed Salwaha, the Founder of the Palestine House of Friendship, will be in town the first week of June, and the meeting has been asked if we would co-sponsor a speaking event with the Catholic Worker House for him that week. Friends ask the committee to proceed with this project.

10-04-10-2011 Trustees are preparing a letter is being drafted to members/attenders regarding continuing membership, and also the request from NEYM for data on members.

10-04-10-2011 The trustees ask if Friends would agree to changing payments to NEYM from annually to quarterly at their request, to help cash flow. Friends approve.

10-04-10-2011 Putter day filled a dumpster last week. More trash is to be thrown out this week.
